LENTEN OFFERING

The Board of Stewardship has designated the Lenten Offering for the **Parish Nurse Program**. Lenten offering envelopes will be in the mailboxes on Ash Wednesday. You can return your gift any time until Easter Sunday. The parish nurse program was restarted last November with our new nurse Ellen Simandl. She currently works 8 hours/week at Benediction. Our nurse does blood pressure screening, health counseling, advocacy, newsletter articles, and other duties to assist our members in their health needs. This goes back to an old LCMS tradition in which CFW Walther writes, "A congregation shall see to it that its members in their sickness are not without the necessary help, daily and nightly nursing, and comfort." (Matt. 25:36 "I was sick, and ye visited Me." 1 Tim. 5:10: If she have relieved the afflicted.") [*Form of a Christian Congregation*, page 151] Currently we have enough funds in the account for 10 months. PAC MAN MISSION OF THE MONTH



Our February Pac Man Mission is the **Lutheran Radio Church Service**, which can be heard each week at **7:00 am on WJYI, 1340 am**. Recently, they have fallen on difficult financial times. Unless they are able to receive \$400 per week from their listeners this broadcast ministry will end on March 18, 2012. This is the one of the oldest programs in the country, which began on February 19, 1928. The Founder of The Lutheran Radio Church Service is Mr. A. J. Beyer. It was his vision, in the early years of radio broadcasting, that this medium could provide an opportunity for his aging parents, and others who were no longer physically able to regularly attend Sunday church services, to be given a means to worship from their homes. Dr. G. Christian Barth, then President of Concordia College in Milwaukee, consented to assume the duties and responsibilities of becoming the program's first Radio Director. Thus was born The Lutheran Radio Church Service.

From its inception in 1928 to 1953, The Lutheran Radio Church Service was a live broadcast, with participants broadcasting live on Sunday mornings from the WTMJ studios. In 1953, an agreement was reached to pre-record the programs for playback on Sunday mornings. The recording of these programs continued to be done at WTMJ's studios. In 1989, with a restructuring of the studios at WTMJ, recording locations away from WTMJ were required. The LCMS recordings are now made at Trinity-Freistadt Lutheran Church and the WELS recordings are made at Wisconsin Lutheran College. you can listen to The Lutheran Radio Church Service on WJYI JOY 1340-AM www.joy1340.com.

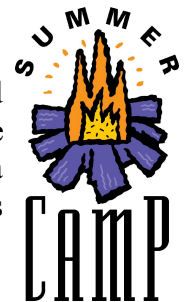


THANKS TO THE SNOW CREWS

One of the best known days in February is Valentine’s Day. Some people are tempted to call February 14th “Hallmark Holiday.” Little wonder because in our country over 7,000,000,000 valentine cards are purchased each year. Most of these cards say “I love you” in one way or another. But what does “I love you” mean? Some would say that “I love you” refers to being physically attracted to a person of the opposite sex. ANNIVERSARY THANK OFFERING



On December 31, 2011, we completed our 3 year thank offering project for the lift project and seminarians. I am happy to report that all pledges that were made for the past three years have been fulfilled.

The grand total of funds raised amounted to \$48,633.95, of which \$43,504.15 was applied to the cost of the lift and \$5,129.80 will be divided between the two seminarians. I feel we can truly be thankful for the efforts we put forth to assure that the handicapped will be able to participate in activities in the lower level of the church, and also provide funds for the seminarians so they can continue to train pastors who will continue to preach the gospel message of salvation at churches they will serve.

The members of Benediction have truly been blessed as they are a blessing to others, such as mentoring three young men as they prepare to serve in special ministries to the Hmong and French Congo people; as some members teach English to the Hmong and teach Sunday school to children who come from different walks of life.

THE LORD'S SUPPER

Who receives this sacrament worthily?

Fasting and bodily preparation are certainly fine outward training. But that person is truly worthy and well prepared, who has faith in these words: "Given and shed for you for the forgiveness of sins."

But anyone who does not believe these words or doubts them is unworthy and unprepared, for the words "for you" require all hearts to believe.

Matthew 3:1 and 4:17 Repent for the kingdom of heaven is near.
